



LEADERSHIP

Lead for Change

Funded by the Victorian Government, 22 Lead for Change participants learned skills to have safe, respectful and effective conversations with people in their own communities which challenge the condoning of violence against women, promote women's independence and decision making, challenge gender stereotypes and strengthen positive, respectful and equal relationships. The diverse communities in which WIRE volunteers live, work and play create broad reach for these change conversations with the aim of influencing people in the moveable middle to create new community standards for safety and gender equality, with the ultimate goal of ending gendered violence. A conversation kit was created and made available to the public to provide information and support around having gender equity conversation that create a positive change.

Training

We expanded our training offering to include intersectional workshops and senior women and money workshops. We further built and enhanced our training on family violence. Through funding by the Victorian Government and the McNamee Foundation WIRE was able to run workshops on Senior women and money, Intersectionality, financial abuse awareness and improving financial capability.

Financial wellbeing

With funding from the Victorian Government, Lou Franklin developed and ran seven Senior Women and Money workshops as well as started work on developing valuable resources for women on having money conversations.

We started an ambitious Financial Capability Project in partnership with Good Shepherd Australia and New Zealand funded by the Victorian Government. We are looking at innovative solutions to enhancing women's financial capability.

We also ran a variety of workshops on financial abuse and improving financial capability.

Julie Harper and Dr Nilmini Fernando delivered two pilot sessions of Recognising and Responding to Financial Abuse and providing effective financial safety responses at all phases of family violence.

As part of the Family Violence Royal Commission recommendations, the Victorian government was to fund the development of a financial literacy/capability program for victim-survivors of family violence. WIRE was honoured to work with the Victorian Department of Education and Training to develop the SARA (Skilled, Aware, Resourceful, Active) course, a financial wellbeing training program for women that is being delivered by 27 Learn Locals across Victoria. WIRE also trained 67 trainers to deliver the training.


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We are privileged to be entrusted with women's experiences of disempowerment. We have an ethical responsibility to talk to power, change structures that impede women, nonbinary and gender-diverse people achieving their goals.

Advocacy guides services and deepens the understanding of policy-makers. Through our advocacy, we shift the information up to where it needs to be, where the people with power can transform systems with it.

Nilmini, researcher and advocate (she/her)

Nilmini joined WIRE in 2016 as a researcher and educator. She is the coordinator of the Purse Project, she has designed and provided professional education for the Family Violence and affiliated community sector in recognising and responding to financial abuse, building financial capabilities for women affected by family violence, and Intersectionality in practice. She conducted WIRE's research into 'When's the Right Time to Talk about Money.' A proud mother, academic and feminist activist, she is likely to prescribe you a book. Her motto: Knowledge is Power.

ADVOCACY

Women + Money

In November 2018, we launched the Women + Money website which has had more than 25,000 visitors. The site is a digital toolkit for the banking and financial sector to help them better support women in their day-to-day interactions with financial services. The project was funded by the NAB Foundation.

Conversations create change

Early this year, we launched Gender Equity and You, the first in a series of conversation kits designed to support transformative conversations for our communities. Gender Equity and You was part of our primary prevention program, Lead For Change, and includes a guide to the five steps to a transformative conversation, a self-care guide and a mythbusting sheet.

Advocacy

In May 2019 WIRE wrote a submission to the Australian Banking Commission (ABA) on the ABA's proposed new guidelines regarding working with vulnerable consumers. Our recommendations related to understanding customers through an intersectional lens and involving victim-survivors of family violence when designing new products and services.

As part of WIRE's work as a Women's Correctional Services Advisory Committee member, changes were made to the strip searching of women prisoners which has seen 16,000 fewer strip searches over approximately the last 12 months.

Research


WIRE's "When's the Right Time to Talk About Money? Maximising financial teachable moments for women affected by family violence" Research (Fernando 2018) indicates when, and how and what conditions enable victim-survivors, as learners, to most benefit from the knowledge and support provided. The research stresses the need to provide targeted, timely and relevant financial safety supports and protections for women at all phases of the family violence journey. The report was launched along with a well attended co-design day and the research is now being incorporated into training and has been widely cited by other organisations and importantly, taken up by financial institutions.

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

Opinion

Note 1. Significant accounting policies

Organisational Information/ Reporting Entity

Women's Information and Referral Exchange Inc. ("WIRE Inc." Or "the Organisation") is an Incorporated Association in Victoria as defined by the Act (2012). The Organisation is also identified as a non-profit public benevolent institution.

Basis of preparation

The Concise Financial Report is an extract for the full Financial Report for the year ended 30 June 2019. The Concise Financial Report has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standard AASB 1039: Concise Financial Reports.
